PLEIN AIR SUPPLY LIST - WATERCOLOR - 2022

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SUGGESTED COLORS:

I prefer a travel palette with tube paints. For plein air I like M. Graham with a few Sennelier and one Daniel Smith. Both made with honey, they re-constitute with water better than other brands I've tried. I squeeze out sizable amounts into my travel palette and allow them to solidify so they don't leak out during travel. For a 3-day event, I don't need to bring the tubes. For a 5-day workshop I bring the tubes, just to be safe. This is a slightly different color/brand palette from my studio colors/brands but there is crossover. Another option: full- or half-pan watercolors - often sold in a travel kit palette with pre-selected colors, but you can buy individual pans as well. Though it's NOT necessary for you to have same brands or colors, I like the following limited palette:

Optional - a few "emergency opaques": white and/or very light colors (these do not go into my palette of colors as listed above) - here are a few I sometimes use to re-claim lost whites/lights:

- Titanium White Gouache or Casein, Acrylic Gouache Matte or Liquid Matte (no particular brands)
- Holbein Watercolor, Jaune Brillant #1
- Acrylic Gouache in pale primary colors

SUGGESTED BRUSHES:

#8 round #4 Winsor & Newton Pointed Round ³⁄₄" Aquarelle ¹/₂" Aquarelle #4 "Quill" Mop or Hake brush for dusting off eraser crumbs



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Compact travel watercolor brushes that have a cap that not only protects the brush head but securely fits on the end of the brush to lengthen the handle are great for plein air work.

PAPER/SUPPORT:

100% rag, 140# watercolor paper, cold press or rough - torn or cut into smaller sizes - or other types of support - 11x14 is the largest size I use but usually choose 8x10 or 9x12 to keep supplies less bulky and as light as possible - my favorites:

- Arches 140 lb rough watercolor tablet, along with a same-size support-board or "Plexiglas" and bulldog clips
- Arches watercolor blocks (I currently favor Arches but other brands are fine as well)
- Crescent Illustration Board (cold press, medium weight #310) pre-cut into smaller sizes
- Archival canvas boards on which I've applied Golden Watercolor Ground prior to the trip

MINIMAL MISCELLANEOUS SUPPLIES:

- Watercolor palette personal choice I use a Mijello 18 well travel palette.
- Collapsible water container
- 2B drawing pencils, or personal choice and a pencil sharpener
- "Vanish" eraser (Jerry's Artorama), "Click eraser", gum eraser or kneadable eraser
- Sketchbook and/or watercolor sketchbook
- Spray bottle that has a fine mist spray
- White facial tissues NON-lotion
- Baby wipes for quick clean-up
- Trash bags
- Backpack

MISCELLANEOUS NON-PAINTING ITEMS:

In addition to your painting supplies, here are some additional items to consider:

- Camera, extra batteries, extra memory cards (I use a digital camera with my phone as back-up.)
- Electronic tablet such as iPad, Samsung, etc. is wonderful for viewing images later in studio.
- Hat
- Sunscreen
- Jacket



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- Drinking water
- Snacks and/or lunch
- Insect repellent: wipes, spray, etc.
- Artist's tape, masking tape or duct tape may come in handy
- Knit gloves with the fingertips cut off
- Towel to sit on
- Wear comfortable shoes and clothes appropriate for the terrain and weather.

I <u>stress</u> that the supplies listed above are what I prefer but are only my suggestions please understand that you are more than welcome to use your own favorites!

Below is my MAXIMAL list of supplies - just in case you're interested!

MAXIMAL MISCELLANEOUS SUPPLIES - NOT AS PORTABLE - SOMETIMES ADDED TO THE ABOVE-LISTED ITEMS

FOR MY "PLEIN AIR to STUDIO WORKSHOPS - THESE ARE TOTALLY OPTIONAL:

- Portable field easel
- Small folding stool OR whatever YOU usually use for plein air painting. (Many people, including myself at times,

just find a rock or wall to sit on and put their drawing board on their lap or the ground. When using an easel, I use an "EASyL Lite" - <u>http://artworkessentials.com/Index.htm</u> - (the Mijello palette fits into it perfectly)

- I also have an Art Comber, a folding chair on wheels with large supply compartment which I love but it depends on space in vehicle. NOT for air travel.
- An umbrella that clamps onto your easel or chair may be a good idea, but I usually don't use one.
- Small pliers or nut cracker for stuck-on lids
- Apron
- Backpack with wheels except for the tripod that my easel fits onto, all of my watercolor equipment fits into this backpack.
